#### ▲ Do not disassemble

Touching the internal parts of the camera or AC adapter could result in injury. Repairs should be performed only by qualified technicians. Should the camera or AC adapter break open as the result of a fall or other accident. take the product to a Nikon-authorized service representative for inspection, after unplugging the product and/or removing the batteries.

#### ▲ Do not use the camera or AC adapter in the presence of flammable gas

#### ▲ Observe caution when handling batteries

- Before replacing the batteries, turn the product off. If you are using an AC adapter, be sure it is unplugged.
- Use only the batteries approved for use in this product (III 12). Do not combine old and new batteries or batteries of different makes or types.

- When charging Nikon EN-MH2 rechargeable Ni-MH batteries, use only the specified charger and charge the batteries four at a time.
   When replacing the batteries with EN-MH2-B2 batteries (available separately), purchase two sets (total of four batteries).
- The EN-MH2 rechargeable batteries are for use with Nikon digital cameras only, and are compatible with COOLPIX L320.
- Insert batteries in the correct orientation.
- Do not short or disassemble batteries or attempt to remove or break battery insulation or casing.
- Do not expose batteries to flame or to excessive heat.
- Do not immerse in or expose to water.
- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Batteries are prone to leakage when fully discharged. To avoid damage to the product, be sure to remove the batteries when no charge remains.

- Discontinue use immediately should you notice any change in the batteries, such as discoloration or deformation.
- If liquid from damaged batteries comes in contact with clothing or skin, rinse immediately with plenty of water.

#### ▲ Observe the following precautions when handling the Battery Chargers (available separately)

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
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


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#### **The Camera Body**







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
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#### Attaching the Camera Strap and Lens Cap

Attach the Lens Cap LC-CP25 to the camera strap, and then attach the strap to the camera.



Attach them at two places.




- Remove the lens cap before you take a picture.
- At times when you are not taking pictures such as when the power is off or while you are carrying the camera, attach the lens cap to the camera to protect the lens.

# Parts of the Camera

#### **Raising and Lowering the Flash**

Press the 🗲 (flash pop-up) button to raise the flash.

- Using the Flash (Flash Modes)  $\rightarrow \square 46$
- Push the flash down gently to lower the flash until it clicks into place when not in use.







#### **Using Menus (MENU Button)**

You can use the multi selector and the 🐼 button to navigate the menus.

1 Press the MENU button.

• The menu is displayed.



**3** Press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\blacktriangledown$  to select another tab.

#### 2 Press the multi selector ◀.

• The current tab is displayed in yellow.



#### 4 Press the 🛞 button.

• You can now select items within the menu.


#### Notes About Setting Menu Items

- Certain menu items cannot be set depending on the current shooting mode or the state of the camera. Unavailable items are displayed in gray and cannot be selected.
- When a menu is displayed, you can switch to shooting mode by pressing the shutter-release button, the ▲ (shooting mode) button, or the ● (\* movie-record) button.

#### **The Monitor**

The information that is displayed in the monitor during shooting and playback changes depending on the camera's settings and state of use.
 By default, information is displayed when you turn on the camera and also when you operate the camera, and disappears after a few seconds (Monitor settings ( 84) > Photo info > Auto info).



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#### **Preparation 1 Insert the Batteries**

## 1 Open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.

• Before opening the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover, hold the camera upside down to prevent the batteries from falling out.

#### **2** Insert the batteries.

 Confirm that the positive (+) and negative (-) terminals are oriented correctly as described on the labels at the entrance of the battery chamber, and insert the batteries.


- **3** Close the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.
  - Slide the cover while securely holding down the area marked
     ②.

#### **Applicable Batteries**

- Four LR6/L40 (AA-size) alkaline batteries (included batteries)
- Four FR6/L91 (AA-size) lithium batteries
- Four EN-MH2 rechargeable Ni-MH (nickel metal hydride) batteries
- \* EN-MH1 rechargeable Ni-MH batteries cannot be used.







#### Removing the Batteries

- Turn the camera off and be sure that the power-on lamp and the monitor have turned off before
  opening the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.
- The camera, batteries, or memory card may be hot immediately after using the camera. Observe caution when removing the batteries or memory card.

#### Notes About the Batteries

- Be sure to read and follow the warnings for the battery on page x and in "Batteries" (24) before use.
- Do not combine old and new batteries or batteries of different makes or types.

#### Battery Type

By setting **Battery type** in the setup menu (D 84) to match the type of batteries inserted in the camera, the batteries can perform more efficiently.

The default setting is the type of batteries included with purchase. When any other type of batteries are used, turn the camera on and change the setting.

#### Notes About EN-MH2 Rechargeable Batteries

When using EN-MH2 batteries with the camera, charge four batteries at a time using Battery Charger MH-73 (+).

#### Alkaline Batteries

Performance of alkaline batteries may vary greatly depending on the manufacturer. Choose a reliable brand.

#### Notes About an AC Power Source

- You can use the AC Adapter EH-67 (available separately; 🟍 68) to power the camera from an electrical outlet.
- Do not, under any circumstances, use another make or model of AC adapter other than the EH-67. Failure to observe this precaution could result in overheating or in damage to the camera.

#### **Preparation 2 Insert a Memory Card**

#### **1** Turn off the camera and open the batterychamber/memory card slot cover.

- When the camera turns off, the monitor turns off.
- Before opening the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover, hold the camera upside down to prevent the batteries from falling out.

#### 2 Insert a memory card.

• Slide the memory card in until it clicks into place.

#### Inserting a Memory Card

**Inserting a memory card upside down or backwards could damage the camera and the memory card.** Be sure to check that the memory card is in the correct orientation.

## **3** Close the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover.

Slide the cover while securely holding down the area marked
 ②.







#### Formatting a Memory Card

- The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, be sure to format it with this camera.
- All data stored on a memory card is permanently deleted when the card is formatted. Copy any data on the card that you wish to keep to a computer before formatting.
- To format a memory card, insert the card into the camera, press the MENU button, and select Format card (∞58) in the setup menu (Ω 84).

#### Notes About Memory Cards

See "Memory Cards" ( $\dot{c}$ <sup>c</sup>6) and the documentation included with your memory card for more information.

#### **Removing the Memory Card**

Turn the camera off and be sure that the power-on lamp and the monitor have turned off before opening the battery-chamber/ memory card slot cover.

Gently push the memory card into the camera  $(\widehat{\mathbf{1}})$  to partially eject the card, and then remove the card  $(\widehat{\mathbf{2}})$ . Do not pull it at an angle.



#### High Temperature Caution

The camera, batteries, and memory card may be hot immediately after using the camera. Observe caution when removing the batteries or memory card.


#### **Internal Memory and Memory Cards**

Camera data, including images and movies, can be saved either in the camera's internal memory (approx. 49 MB) or on a memory card. Remove the memory card to use the internal memory for image saving and playback.

#### Preparation 3 Set the Display Language, Date, and Time

When the camera is turned on for the first time, the language-selection screen and the date and time setting screen for the camera clock are displayed.

- Press the power switch to turn on the camera.
  - When the camera is turned on, the power-on lamp (green) lights and then the monitor turns on (the power-on lamp turns off when the monitor turns on).



2 Press the multi selector ▲ or ▼ to select the desired language and then press the <sup>®</sup> button.





 Press ▲ or ▼ to select Yes and then press the w button.

 Press ▲ to enable daylight saving time. When the daylight saving time function is enabled, � is displayed at the top of the monitor. Press ▼ to disable the daylight saving time function.

# 5 Press ▲ or ▼ to select the date format and then press the 🕲 button.

# 6 Press ▲, ▼, ◀, or ► to set the date and time, and then press the 🛞 button.

- Select an item: Press ► or ◀ (changes between D, M, Y, hour, and minute).
- Edit the date and time: Press  $\blacktriangle$  or  $\mathbf{\nabla}$ .
- Confirm the setting: Select the minute setting and then press the 🛞 button.

• The lens extends and the shooting-mode selection screen is displayed.

- The camera enters the shooting mode and you can take pictures in Easy auto mode ( 22).





#### Changing the Language Setting and the Date and Time Setting

- You can change these settings using the Language (☎59) and Time zone and date (☎47) settings in the ¥ setup menu (□ 84).
- You can enable and disable daylight saving time by selecting the **Y** setup menu > **Time zone** and date ( ↔ 47) > **Time zone**. When enabled, the clock moves forward one hour; when disabled, the clock moves back one hour. When the travel destination ( ) is selected, the time difference between the travel destination and the home time zone ( ) is automatically calculated and the date and time in the selected region are saved at the time of shooting.
- If you exit without setting the date and time, I flashes when the shooting screen is displayed. Use the **Time zone and date** setting in the setup menu to set the date and time (I 84, + 47).

# The Clock Battery

- The camera's clock is powered by an internal backup battery. The backup battery is charged when the main batteries are inserted into the camera or when the camera is connected to an optional AC adapter, and can provide several days of backup power after about 10 hours of charging.
- If the camera's backup battery becomes exhausted, the date and time setting screen is displayed when the camera is turned on. Set the date and time again. → Step 3 of "Preparation 3 Set the Display Language, Date, and Time" (□ 16)

#### Imprinting the Shooting Date in Printed Images

- Set the date and time before shooting.
- You can permanently imprint the shooting date in images as they are captured by setting **Print date** ( $\stackrel{\bullet}{\longrightarrow}$  52) in the setup menu ( $\stackrel{\bullet}{\square}$  84).
- If you want the shooting date to be printed without using the **Print date** setting, print using the ViewNX 2 software ( 69).

# Step 1 Turn the Camera On

# **1** Remove the lens cap and press the power switch to turn on the camera.

- The lens extends and the monitor turns on.
- Raise the flash when using it (🛄 5).



# **2** Check the battery level indicator and the number of exposures remaining.

#### **Battery Level Indicator**

Display	Description
	Battery level high.
	Battery level low. Prepare to replace the batteries.
Battery exhausted.	Cannot take pictures. Replace the batteries.

#### Number of Exposures Remaining

The number of pictures that can be taken is displayed.

- Im is displayed when no memory card is inserted in the camera, and images are saved in the internal memory (approx. 49 MB).
- The number of exposures remaining depends on the amount of available memory in the internal memory or memory card, and also varies depending on the image quality and image size (determined by the image mode setting; □ 57, ⇔25).

# Notes About the Flash

The flash does not pop-up automatically. Raise the flash ( $\square$  5, 46) in situations where you want to use the flash, such as in dark locations or when the subject is backlit.

# Turning the Camera On and Off


- Remove the lens cap and turn the camera on.
- When the camera is turned on, the power-on lamp (green) lights and then the monitor turns on (the power-on lamp turns off when the monitor turns on).
- To turn off the camera, press the power switch. When the camera turns off, the power-on lamp and the monitor turn off.
- You can press and hold the D (playback) button to turn on the camera and switch to
  playback mode. The lens does not extend.

# Power Saving Function (Auto Off)

If no operations are performed for a while, the monitor turns off, the camera enters standby mode, and the power-on lamp flashes. If no operations are performed for approx. another three minutes, the camera turns off automatically.

While the camera is in standby mode, the monitor turns back on if you perform any of the following operations:

→ Press the power switch, shutter-release button, 
(shooting mode) button, 
(playback) button, 
(playback) button, 
(characteristic structure)




- The time that elapses before the camera enters standby mode can be changed using the **Auto off** setting in the setup menu (CIII 84).
- By default, the camera enters standby mode in about 30 seconds when you are using shooting mode or playback mode.
- If you are using the optional AC Adapter EH-67, the camera enters standby mode after 30 minutes.

# Step 2 Select a Shooting Mode



• The shooting-mode selection menu, which allows you to select the desired shooting mode, is displayed.



# 2 Press the multi selector ▲ or ▼ to select the desired shooting mode and then press the 🛞 button.

- 🗳 (easy auto) mode is used in this example.
- The shooting mode setting is saved when the camera is turned off.



# **Available Shooting Modes**

# **Step 3 Frame a Picture**

# **1** Hold the camera steady.

 Keep fingers, hair, the camera strap, and other objects away from the lens, flash, AF-assist illuminator, and microphone.





# **2** Frame the picture.

- Aim the camera at the desired subject.
- When the camera automatically determines the scene mode, the shooting mode icon changes (C 34).

- Depending upon shooting conditions, the camera may not select the desired scene mode. In this case, select another shooting mode (CC) 35, 41, and 44).
- When the digital zoom is in effect, the scene mode changes to 😰.


## When Using a Tripod

- We recommend using a tripod to stabilize the camera in the following situations:
  - When shooting in dimly lit conditions with the flash mode ( $\square$  47) set to  $\ref{eq:2}$  (off)
  - When zooming in on the subject
- Set Vibration reduction to Off in the setup menu ( 84) when using a tripod.

# Using the Zoom

Rotate the zoom control to activate optical zoom.

- To zoom in closer to the subject, rotate the zoom control to **T** (telephoto).
- To zoom out and view a larger area, rotate the zoom control to **W** (wide-angle).
   When you turn the camera on, the zoom moves to the maximum wide-angle position.
- A zoom indicator is displayed at the top of the monitor when the zoom control is rotated.

 If you rotate the zoom control to **T** when the camera is zoomed in to the maximum optical

zoom position, you can use the digital zoom to magnify the image further by up to 4x.

# Digital Zoom and Interpolation

When using the digital zoom, image quality deteriorates when zooming in past  $\Delta$  in the zoom indicator.

The position of  $\mathbf{\Delta}$  is more to the right when shooting smaller images; therefore, when the image size is smaller (as determined by the image

mode setting; 🛄 57, 🖚 24), more digital zoom can be applied without image quality deterioration.

# **Step 4 Focus and Shoot**

- 1 Press the shutter-release button halfway (C 27).
  - When a face is detected: The camera focuses on the face framed by the yellow double border (focus area). When the subject is in focus, the double border turns green.
  - When no faces are detected: The camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame. When the camera has focused, the focus area turns green.

- While the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, the focus area or focus indicator may flash in red. This indicates that the camera is unable to focus. Modify the composition and then press the shutter-release button halfway again.
- 2 Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down (C 27).
  - The shutter is released and the image is saved.









Press halfway		To set focus and exposure (shutter speed and aperture value), press the shutter-release button halfway, stopping when you feel resistance. Focus and exposure remain locked while the shutter- release button is pressed halfway.
Press all the way	<b>↓</b>	While pressing the shutter-release button halfway, press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down to release the shutter and take a picture. Do not use force when pressing the shutter-release button, as this may result in camera shake and blurred images. Press the button gently.

# Notes About Saving Data

After taking pictures or recording movies, the number of exposures remaining or the remaining recording time flashes while images or movies are being saved. **Do not open the batterychamber/memory card slot cover**. Image and movie data could be lost and the camera or memory card could be damaged.

# AF-assist Illuminator and Flash

If the subject is dimly lit, the AF-assist illuminator ( $\square$  84) may light when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, and the flash ( $\square$  46) may fire when the shutter-release button is pressed all the way down.


## 🖉 To Make Sure You Do Not Miss a Shot

If you are concerned that you might miss a shot, press the shutter-release button all the way without first pressing it halfway.

# **Step 5 Play Back Images**

# 1 Press the 🕨 (playback) button.

 The camera switches to playback mode and the last image saved is displayed in full-frame playback mode.



# **2** Use the multi selector to select an image to display.

- Display the previous image: ▲ or ◀
- Display the next image: ▼ or ▶
- Press and hold ▲, ▼, ◀, or ► to scroll quickly through images.
- Remove the memory card from the camera to play back images saved in the camera's internal memory. IN is displayed near the current image number/total number of images.
- To return to shooting mode, press the <sup>▲</sup> button, the shutter-release button, or the <sup>●</sup> (\*<sup>★</sup> movie-record) button.

# The Basics of Shooting and Playback

# 🖉 Viewing Images

- Images may be displayed briefly at low resolution immediately after switching to the previous image or next image.
- When you play back images in which the face of a person ( $\bigcirc$  59) or pet ( $\bigcirc$  40) was detected at the time of shooting, depending on the orientation of the detected face, the images are automatically rotated for playback display.



  - Erase selected images: Multiple images can be selected and deleted (CC 31).
  - All images: All images are deleted.

# Notes About Deletion

- Deleted images cannot be recovered. Copy important images to a computer before deleting them from the camera.
- Protected images (🛄 66) cannot be deleted.

#### Deleting the Last Image Captured While in Shooting Mode

When using shooting mode, press the  $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{m}}$  button to delete the last image that was saved.



- If no faces are detected, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.
- Digital zoom cannot be used.

#### Landscape

The focus area or focus indicator (
 <sup>(1)</sup> 9) always turns green when the shutter-release button is
 pressed halfway.

#### 💐 Sports

- The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.
- If you continue to hold the shutter-release button all the way down, about four images are captured continuously at a rate of about 1.2 fps (when Image mode is set to 100 4608×3456).
- The camera focuses even when the shutter-release button is not pressed halfway. You may hear the sound of the camera focusing.
- Focus, exposure, and hue are fixed at the values determined with the first image in each series.
- The frame rate with continuous shooting may vary depending upon the current image mode setting, the memory card used, or shooting condition.

#### 📑 Night portrait

- The flash always fires. Raise the flash before shooting.
- When the camera detects a person's face, it focuses on that face (🛄 59).
- The skin softening feature makes the skin tones in people's faces appear smoother (🛄 43).
- If no faces are detected, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.
- Digital zoom cannot be used.

#### X Party/indoor

- The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.
- As images are easily affected by camera shake, hold the camera steadily. Set Vibration reduction to Off in the setup menu ( 84) when shooting using a tripod to stabilize the camera.

• The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.

#### Snow

• The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.

#### 🚔 Sunset

• The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.

#### 📸 Dusk/dawn

The focus area or focus indicator (
 <sup>(1)</sup> 9) always turns green when the shutter-release button is
 pressed halfway.

(A): Shutter speed is reduced when using scene modes indicated with (A); therefore, the use of a tripod is recommended. Set Vibration reduction to Off in the setup menu (C) 84) when shooting using a tripod to stabilize the camera.

#### 🔜 Night landscape

The focus area or focus indicator (
 <sup>(1)</sup> 9) always turns green when the shutter-release button is
 pressed halfway.

#### 🏶 Close-up

- Macro mode (CC 51) is enabled and the camera automatically zooms to the closest position at which it can shoot.
- The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame. Use focus lock to frame the picture on an object not in the center of the frame (CD 60).
- The camera focuses even when the shutter-release button is not pressed halfway. You may hear the sound of the camera focusing.

#### **TI** Food

- Macro mode (
   <sup>[1]</sup> 51) is enabled and the camera automatically zooms to the closest position at which it can shoot.
- You can adjust hue by pressing the multi selector ▲ or ▼. The hue setting is saved in the camera's memory even after the camera is turned off.
- The camera focuses even when the shutter-release button is not pressed halfway. You may hear the sound of the camera focusing.



#### 🟛 Museum

- The flash does not fire.
- The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.
- The camera captures a series of up to 10 images while the shutter-release button is held all the way
  down, and the sharpest image in the series is automatically selected and saved (BSS (best shot
  selector)).
- ★: Shutter speed is reduced when using scene modes indicated with ★; therefore, the use of a tripod is recommended. Set Vibration reduction to Off in the setup menu (□ 84) when shooting using a tripod to stabilize the camera.

#### Fireworks show



- Shutter speed is fixed at four seconds.
- The camera focuses at infinity.
- When the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, the focus indicator ( 9) always turns green.

#### Black and white copy

- The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.
- Use together with macro mode (CC 51) when shooting subjects that are close to the camera.

#### 🖀 Backlighting

- The flash always fires. Raise the flash before shooting.
- The camera focuses on the area in the center of the frame.

#### 🕅 Panorama assist

- Use this setting to capture a series of images that will be connected using a computer to form a
  panorama image ( 2).
- After shooting the first image, confirm on the screen how the captured image will be connected to the next image, and shoot the next image. Shoot as many images as needed to complete the panorama. To finish shooting, press the 🛞 button.

(A): Shutter speed is reduced when using scene modes indicated with (A); therefore, the use of a tripod is recommended. Set Vibration reduction to Off in the setup menu (C) 84) when shooting using a tripod to stabilize the camera.

#### 🦋 Pet portrait

- When you aim the camera at the face of a dog or cat, the camera can detect the face and focus on it. By default, the camera automatically releases the shutter once it has focused (pet portrait auto release).
- After you select 🐝 Pet portrait, select Single or Continuous on the next screen.
  - Single: Images are captured one at a time.
  - Continuous: When the camera has focused on the detected face, it captures three images continuously at a rate of about 1.2 fps. When shooting manually, the camera captures up to about four images at a rate of about 1.2 fps while you hold the shutter-release button all the way down (when Image mode is set to 1.2 fps 4608×3456).

# V Pet Portrait Auto Release

- To change **Pet portrait auto release** settings, press the multi selector ◀ (ⓒ).
  - Discrete states a pet's face, it focuses and then releases the shutter automatically.
  - OFF: The camera does not release the shutter automatically, even if a pet's face is detected. Press the shutter-release button to release the shutter.
- Pet portrait auto release turns off automatically when:
  - Five bursts have been taken.
  - Internal memory or the memory card is full.


To continue shooting with **Pet portrait auto release**, press the multi selector **4** (**b**) to set again.

# **Focus** Area

- When the camera detects a face, a yellow double border (focus area) is displayed around the face, and the double border turns green when the camera has focused.
- When the camera detects more than one dog or cat face (up to five can be detected), the face displayed largest in the monitor is framed by a double border and the others by single borders.
- If no pets' faces are detected, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.

# Notes About Pet Portrait

- Digital zoom cannot be used.
- Depending on the distance of the subject from the camera, the speed of the subject's movement, the direction that the subject is facing, the ambient brightness of the face, etc., pet faces may not be detected or other subjects may be framed by a border.



# Smart Portrait Mode (Capturing Smiling Faces)

When the camera detects a smiling face, you can take a picture automatically without pressing the shutter-release button (smile timer). You can use the skin softening option to smooth the skin tones in people's faces.

#### Enter shooting mode → 🗖 (shooting mode) button → 🐷 Smart portrait mode → 🛞 button

# **1** Frame the picture.

- Raise the flash when using it (DD 5).
- Point the camera at a person's face.
- "Using Face Detection" (🛄 59)

# **2** Wait for the subject to smile. Do not press the shutter-release button.

- If the camera detects that the face framed by the double border is smiling, it automatically releases the shutter (Smile timer; C) 57, 433).
- After the camera releases the shutter, it continues to detect faces and smiles, and releases the shutter again if it detects a smiling face.

# **3** Shooting ends.

- To cancel smile detection and stop shooting, perform any of the following operations:
  - Turn the camera off.
  - Set Smile timer (🛄 57, 🏍 33) to Off.
  - Press the 🖸 button and select a different shooting mode.

# Notes About Smart Portrait Mode

- Digital zoom cannot be used.
- Under some shooting conditions, the camera may be unable to detect faces or detect smiles.
- "Notes About Face Detection"  $\rightarrow$   $\square$  59

## 🖉 Auto Off When Using Smile Timer

When **Smile timer** is set to **On**, the auto off function ( $\square$  84) is activated and the camera turns off when either of the situations indicated below persists and no other operations are performed.

- The camera does not detect any faces.
- The camera detected a face, but cannot detect a smile.

#### When the Self-timer Lamp Flashes

When using smile timer, the self-timer lamp flashes when the camera detects a face and flashes quickly immediately after the shutter is released.

#### Releasing the Shutter Manually

The shutter can also be released by pressing the shutter-release button. If no faces are detected, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.

## **Changing Smart Portrait Mode Settings**

- Features that can be set using the multi selector (□ 45) → Flash mode (□ 46), self-timer (□ 49), and exposure compensation (□ 53)

# **Using Skin Softening**

When the shutter is released in one of the following shooting modes, the camera detects one or more person's faces (up to three), and processes the image to soften facial skin tones.

- Portrait or Night portrait in 🗳 (easy auto) mode (🛄 34)
- Portrait ( 36) or Night portrait ( 37) in scene mode
- Smart portrait mode ( 141)

Skin softening can also be applied to saved images (🛄 66, 🏍 8).

# Notes About Skin Softening

- It may take more time than usual to save images after shooting.
- Under some shooting conditions, the desired skin softening results may not be achieved, or skin softening may be applied to areas of the image where there are no faces.

# 🖸 (Auto) Mode

Used for general shooting. Settings can be adjusted in the shooting menu ( $\square$  56) to suit the shooting conditions and the type of picture you want to take.




# Using the Flash (Flash Modes)

In dark locations or when the subject is backlit, you can take pictures with the flash by raising the flash.

You can set the flash mode.

# 1 Press the 🗲 (flash pop-up) button.

- The flash pops up.
- When the flash is lowered, flash mode is fixed at 🕲 (off).





**2** Press the multi selector  $\blacktriangle$  (**4** flash mode).



# **3** Press $\blacktriangle$ or $\blacktriangledown$ to select the desired mode and then press the M button.

- Available Flash Modes  $\rightarrow \square$  47
- If a setting is not applied by pressing the 🕲 button within a few seconds, the selection is canceled.

# Lowering the Flash

Push the flash down gently to lower the flash until it clicks into place when not in use ( $\square$  5).

# The Flash Lamp

The flash lamp indicates the status of the flash when you press the shutter-release button halfway.

- On: The flash fires when a picture is taken.
- Flashing: The flash is charging. The camera cannot take pictures.
- Off: The flash does not fire when a picture is taken.

If the battery level is low, the monitor turns off while the flash is charging.

# Interstand Mode Setting

- The setting varies with the shooting mode.
  - → "Available Features" (🛄 45)
  - → "Default Settings" (🛄 54)
- Some settings cannot be used with other functions (🛄 58).
- The flash mode setting applied in 🖸 (auto) mode is saved in the camera's memory even after the camera is turned off.

# Effective Range of the Flash

When ISO sensitivity is set to **Auto**, the flash has a range of approx. 0.5–5.0 m (1 ft 8 in.–16 ft) at the maximum wide-angle zoom position and a range of approx. 1.5–2.5 m (5 ft–8 ft 2 in.) at the maximum telephoto zoom position.


# 🖉 Red-eye Reduction

This camera uses "Advanced Red-Eye Reduction (In-Camera Red-Eye Fix)."

Pre-flashes are fired repeatedly at low intensity before the main flash, reducing the red-eye effect. Additionally, if the camera detects red eye while saving an image, the affected area is processed to reduce red-eye before the image is saved.


Note the following when shooting:

- Because pre-flashes are fired, there is a slight lag between when the shutter-release button is
  pressed and when the shutter is released.
- More time than usual is required to save images.
- Red-eye reduction may not produce the desired results in all situations.
- In rare cases, areas of the image that are not affected by red-eye may be processed by red-eye reduction. In these cases, select another flash mode and take the picture again.




The camera's self-timer can release the shutter about 10 seconds after you press the shutter-release button.

The self-timer is useful when you want to be in the picture you are taking, or when you want to avoid the effects of camera shake that occur when you press the shutter-release button. When using the self-timer, use of a tripod is recommended. Set **Vibration reduction** to **Off** in the setup menu ( $\square$  84) when shooting using a tripod to stabilize the camera.



# **4** Press the shutter-release button the rest of the way down.

- The self-timer starts, and the number of seconds remaining before the shutter is released is displayed in the monitor. The self-timer lamp flashes while the timer is counting down. About one second before the shutter is released, the lamp stops flashing and glows steadily.
- When the shutter is released, the self-timer is set to **OFF**.
- To stop the timer before a picture is taken, press the shutter-release button again.






When using macro mode, the camera can focus on objects as close as about 1 cm (0.4 in.) from the lens

This feature is useful when taking close-up pictures of flowers and other small subjects.



#### 3 Use the zoom control to set the zoom to a turn green.

- How close you can be to the subject when shooting depends on the zoom position. When the zoom is set to a position where  $\frac{6}{3}$  and the zoom indicator turn green, the camera can focus on subjects as close as about 10 cm (4 in.) from the lens.
- When the zoom position is in the area indicated by ①, the camera can focus on objects as close as about 1 cm (0.4 in.) from the lens



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# Notes About Using the Flash

The flash may be unable to light the entire subject at distances of less than 50 cm (1 ft 8 in.).

# 🖉 Autofocus

When shooting still images in macro mode, the camera focuses continuously until the shutterrelease button is pressed halfway to lock the focus. You may hear the sound of the camera focusing.

# Intermediate Macro Mode Setting

- Macro mode cannot be used when using certain shooting modes.  $\rightarrow$  "Default Settings" ( $\square$  54)
- The macro mode setting applied in **(**auto) mode is saved in the camera's memory even after the camera is turned off.

### Adjusting Brightness (Exposure Compensation)

You can adjust overall image brightness.



- To make the image brighter, apply positive (+) exposure compensation.
- To make the image darker, apply negative (–) exposure compensation.



# **3** Press the 🛞 button to apply the compensation value.

- If you do not press the 🛞 button within a few seconds, the setting is applied and the menu disappears.

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#### 4 Press the shutter-release button to take a picture.

• To turn off exposure compensation, return to step 1 and change the value to 0.0.

#### Exposure Compensation Value

The exposure compensation value applied in **(**auto) mode is saved in the camera's memory even after the camera is turned off.

### **Using Face Detection**

In the following shooting modes, the camera uses face detection to automatically focus on people's faces. If the camera detects more than one face, a double border is displayed around the face that the camera focuses on, and single borders are displayed around the other faces.

• If no faces are detected when the shutter-release button is pressed halfway, the camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame.

#### Notes About Face Detection


- The camera's ability to detect faces depends on a variety of factors, including whether or not the subject
  is facing the camera. Additionally, the camera may be unable to detect faces in the following situations:
  - When faces are partially hidden by sunglasses or otherwise obstructed
  - When faces take up too much or too little of the frame
- When the frame includes more than one person's face, the faces detected by the camera and the face on which the camera focuses depend upon a variety of factors, including the direction in which the faces are looking.
- In some rare cases, such as those described in "Subjects Not Suitable for Autofocus" (
   <sup>(1)</sup> 61), the subject may not be in focus even though the double border turns green. Should this occur, use another mode, such as 
   <sup>(1)</sup> (auto) mode, and try focus lock shooting (
   <sup>(1)</sup> 60) by focusing on another subject that is the same distance from the camera.

### **Focus Lock**

When the camera focuses on an object in the center of the frame, you can use focus lock to focus on an off-center subject.

Use the following procedure when taking pictures using 🗖 (auto) mode.


- 1 Aim the camera at the subject so that the subject is in the center of the frame.
- **2** Press the shutter-release button halfway.
  - Confirm that the focus area turns green.
  - · Focus and exposure are locked.



# **3** Continue holding down the shutter-release button halfway and recompose the picture.

• Be sure to maintain the same distance between the camera and the subject.







# Subjects Not Suitable for Autofocus

The camera may not focus as expected in the following situations. In some rare cases, the subject may not be in focus despite the fact that the focus area or the focus indicator turns green:

- Subject is very dark
- Objects of sharply differing brightness are included in the scene (e.g. the sun behind the subject makes that subject appear very dark)
- No contrast between the subject and surroundings (e.g. a portrait subject, wearing a white shirt, is standing in front of a white wall)
- Several objects are at different distances from the camera (e.g. an animal inside a cage)
- Subjects with repeating patterns (window blinds, buildings with multiple rows of similarly shaped windows, etc.)
- Subject is moving rapidly

In the situations noted above, try pressing the shutter-release button halfway to refocus several times, or select **(a)** (auto) mode and use focus lock (**(()** 60) to take the picture by first focusing on an object that is the same distance from the camera as the desired subject.

# Playback Features

This chapter describes the features that are available when playing back images.



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# **Playback Zoom**

Rotating the zoom control to T(Q) in full-frame playback mode ( $\Box$  28) zooms in on the center of the image displayed in the monitor.



- You can change the zoom ratio by rotating the zoom control to W (S) or T (Q). Images can be zoomed up to approx. 10x.
- To view a different area of the image, press the multi selector ▲, ▼, ◄, or ▶.
- If you are viewing an image that was captured using face detection (□ 59) or pet detection (□ 40), the camera zooms in on the face detected at the time of shooting. If the camera detected multiple faces when the image was captured, press ▲, ▼, ◀, or ▶ to display a different face. To zoom in on an area of the image where there are no faces, adjust the zoom ratio and then press ▲, ▼, ◀, or ▶.
- Press the 🛞 button to return to full-frame playback mode.

# Thumbnail Display, Calendar Display

Rotating the zoom control to **W** (🔄) in full-frame playback mode (🛄 28) displays images in "contact sheets" of thumbnail images.



- You can view several images on one screen, making it easy to find the image you want.
- You can change the number of thumbnails displayed by rotating the zoom control to W ( ) or T ( ).
- Press the multi selector ▲, ▼, ◀, or ▶ to select an image, and then press the ℗ button to display that image full-frame.
- When 16 thumbnails are displayed, rotate the zoom control to **W** (🔄) to switch to calendar display.
- While using calendar display mode, press ▲, ▼, ◀, or ▶ to select a date and then press the 🐼 button to display the first image captured on that day.

#### Notes About Calendar Display

Images captured when the camera's date is not set are treated as images captured on January 1, 2013.





• Direct USB connection: Turn the camera off and ensure that the memory card is inserted in the camera. Connect the camera to the computer using the included USB cable. Turn the camera on. To transfer images that are saved in the camera's internal memory, remove the memory card from the camera before connecting it to the computer.



- SD card slot: If your computer is equipped with an SD card slot, the card can be inserted directly in the slot.







• Recording movies while the flash is raised may cause the audio to be muffled.

# 3 Press the ● (\* movie-record) button to start movie recording.

- The camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame. Focus areas are not displayed during recording.
- When Movie options is set to 720 HD 720p (1280×720), the monitor display changes to a 16:9 aspect ratio when recording movies.
- If Photo info in Monitor settings (
   <sup>10</sup> 84) in the setup menu is set to Movie frame+auto info, the area that is visible in the movie can be confirmed before movie recording starts.
- 🔝 is displayed while saving to the internal memory.





Press the lacksquare (🔭 movie-record) button again to end recording.

#### Notes About Saving Data

After taking pictures or recording movies, the number of exposures remaining or the remaining recording time flashes while images or movies are being saved. **Do not open the batterychamber/memory card slot cover**. Image and movie data could be lost and the camera or memory card could be damaged.

#### Notes About Movie Recording

- Memory cards with an SD Speed Class rating of 6 or faster are recommended when recording movies (2019). Movie recording may stop unexpectedly when memory cards with a lower Speed Class rating are used.
- Image quality degrades when digital zoom is used. If the digital zoom is not being used when
  movie recording begins, turning and holding the zoom control toward T magnifies the image
  using optical zoom and the zoom stops at the maximum optical zoom ratio. After letting go of the
  zoom control, turn the zoom control toward T again to magnify the image using the digital zoom.
- When recording ends, digital zoom turns off.
- The sounds of zoom control operation, zoom, autofocus lens drive movement, vibration reduction, and aperture operation when brightness changes may be recorded.
- Smear (2) visible in the monitor with movie recording is recorded with movies. Avoiding bright
  objects such as the sun, reflections of the sun, and electric lights is recommended.
- Depending on the distance to the subject or the amount of zoom applied, subjects with repeating patterns (fabrics, lattice windows, etc.) may have colored stripes (interference patterns, moire, etc.) in them during movie recording and playback. This occurs when the pattern in the subject and the layout of the image sensor interfere with each other; it is not a malfunction.

#### Camera Temperature

- The camera may become warm when recording movies for an extended period of time or when the camera is used in a hot area.
- If the inside of the camera becomes extremely hot when recording movies, the camera will automatically stop recording after 30 seconds.

The amount of time remaining until the camera stops recording (2) 30s) is displayed.

After the camera stops recording, it turns itself off.

Leave the camera off until the inside of the camera has cooled.

#### Notes About Autofocus

Autofocus may not perform as expected (CC 61). Should this occur, try the following:

- Set Autofocus mode in the movie menu to AF−S Single AF (default setting) before starting movie recording (□ 79, ∞45).
- 2. Frame another subject—positioned at the same distance from the camera as the intended subject—in the center of the frame, press the (\* movie-record) button to start recording, and then modify the composition.

#### Functions Available with Movie Recording

- The exposure compensation, white balance, and color options settings for the current shooting mode are also applied with movie recording. The tone that results from using scene mode ( $\square$  35) is also applied to movies. When macro mode is enabled, movies of subjects closer to the camera can be recorded. Confirm settings before starting movie recording.
- The self-timer (□ 49) can be used. Set the self-timer and then press the (\*★ movie-record) button to start recording a movie after 10 seconds.
- The flash does not fire.
- Press the MENU button to select the 🐙 (movie) tab and adjust movie menu settings before starting movie recording (C 79).

Rotate the zoom control to  ${\boldsymbol{\mathsf{T}}}$  or  ${\boldsymbol{\mathsf{W}}}$  during playback.



#### Notes About Playing Back Movies

This camera cannot play back movies recorded with another make or model of digital camera.

# **Using Panorama Assist**

The camera focuses on the subject in the center of the frame. Use a tripod for the best results. Set **Vibration reduction** (20053) to **Off** in the setup menu when using a tripod to stabilize the camera.

Enter shooting mode  $\Rightarrow \square$  (shooting mode) button  $\Rightarrow \cancel{2}$  (second icon from the top\*)  $\Rightarrow \Rightarrow \blacktriangle$ ,  $\bigtriangledown$ ,  $\checkmark$ ,  $\blacklozenge$ ,  $\Rightarrow$ ,  $\blacksquare$ ,  $(Panorama assist) <math>\Rightarrow$  (W) button

\* The icon of the last scene selected is displayed.

# 1 Use the multi selector to select the direction and press the <sup>™</sup> button.

 Panorama direction icons are displayed to show the direction in which images will be joined. Select the direction in which images will be joined in the completed panorama; right (▷), left (◁), up (△), or down (▽).



 The yellow panorama direction icon (DD) is displayed according to the direction you selected. Press the

M button to confirm the selection. The icon changes to the white fixed-direction icon (D).

- If necessary, apply flash mode (\$\overline\$ 46), self-timer (\$\overline\$ 49), macro mode (\$\overline\$ 51), and exposure compensation (\$\overline\$ 53) settings with this step.
- Press the 🛞 button again to select a different direction.
- 2 Frame the first portion of the panorama scene and take the first picture.
  - About one third of the image is displayed as translucent.





# **3** Take the next picture.

- Frame the next image so that one third of the frame overlaps the first image, and press the shutter-release button.
- Repeat this process until the necessary number of images has been taken to complete the scene.

# 4 Press the 🛞 button when shooting is complete.

• The camera returns to step 1.

# Notes About Panorama Assist

- Flash mode, self-timer, macro mode, and exposure compensation settings cannot be adjusted after the first picture is taken. Images cannot be deleted, nor can zoom or **Image mode** settings (��24) be adjusted after the first picture has been taken.
- Shooting for the panorama series is terminated if the auto off function (57) initiates standby mode when shooting. Setting the time allowed to elapse before the auto off function is enabled to a longer setting is recommended.

# AE/AF-L Indicator

In **Panorama assist** scene mode, exposure, white balance, and focus for all images in a panorama are fixed at the values for the first image in each series.

When the first picture is taken, AE/AFL is displayed to indicate that exposure, white balance, and focus are locked.







#### Combining Images to Make a Panorama (Panorama Maker)

- You can transfer images to a computer (22) and use Panorama Maker to join multiple images to make a single panorama.
- Install Panorama Maker from the included "ViewNX 2" CD-ROM ( 69).

# Notes About Image Editing

- Images captured at an Image mode (♂ 24) setting of 🔀 4608×2592 cannot be edited.
- This camera cannot edit images captured with another make or model of digital camera.
- If no people's faces are detected in an image, a copy cannot be created using the skin softening function (**66**8).
- When using another make or model of digital camera, images edited with this camera may not be displayed properly and may not be able to be transferred to a computer.
- Editing functions are not available when there is not enough free space in the internal memory or on the memory card.

#### Restrictions on Image Editing

The camera detects people's faces in images and creates a copy with softer facial skin tones.

- The confirmation dialog is displayed with the face to which the effect was applied enlarged in the center of the monitor.
- To exit without saving the copy, press ◀.

- Skin tones of up to 12 faces, in the order of that closest to the center of the frame, are softened.



# 🐰 Crop: Creating a Cropped Copy

You can create a copy containing only the portion visible in the monitor when  $\mathbb{MEND}$  is displayed with playback zoom ( $\square$  64) enabled.

- Rotate the zoom control to T (Q) in full-frame playback mode (
   28) to zoom in on the image.
  - To crop an image displayed in "tall" (portrait) orientation, zoom in on the image until the black bars displayed on the both sides of the monitor disappear. 



# **Editing Movies**

The desired portions of a recorded movie can be saved as a separate file.

- 1 Play back the desired movie and pause playback (🛄 81).
- - The movie edit screen is displayed.



- When you start editing a movie, the frame displayed when the movie was paused is the start point of the edit.
- To cancel editing, press ▲ or ▼ to select (return), and then press the ⊛ button.

## 4 Press ▲ or ▼ to select 🖏 (choose end point).

- Press ◀ or ▶ to move the end point on the right edge to the end of the desired portion of the movie.

- Movies are trimmed in one-second intervals; therefore, the actual trimmed portion of the movie may differ slightly from the selected start and end points. Movies cannot be trimmed so that they are less than two seconds long.


# Connecting the Camera to a TV (Viewing Images on a TV)

Connect the camera to a TV using the optional audio/video cable (668) to play back images on the TV.

# 1 Turn off the camera.

### **2** Connect the camera to the TV.

• Connect the yellow plug of the audio/video cable to the video-in jack and the white plug to the audio-in jack on the TV.



### **3** Set the TV's input to external video input.

  - While connected to the TV, the camera monitor remains off.



# **Connecting the Camera to a Printer (Direct Print)**

Users of PictBridge-compatible ( $\not{c}$  20) printers can connect the camera directly to the printer and print images without using a computer. Follow the procedures below to print images.



# Notes About Power Source

- When connecting the camera to a printer, use batteries with a sufficient amount of charge remaining to prevent the camera from turning off unexpectedly.
- You can use the AC Adapter EH-67 (available separately) to power the camera from an electrical outlet. Do not use any other make or model of AC adapter as it may cause the camera to heat up or malfunction.

### Printing Images

In addition to printing images transferred to a computer from your personal printer and printing over a direct camera-to-printer connection, the following options are also available for printing images saved on the memory card:

- Inserting the memory card into a DPOF-compatible printer's card slot
- Taking the memory card to a digital photo lab

When using these methods to print, you can use the **Print order** option in the playback menu to specify which images will be printed and how many copies of each image will be printed, and save these settings on the memory card (

 To confirm the number of images that can be saved in the internal memory (approx. 49 MB), remove the memory card from the camera, and then check the number of remaining exposures displayed in the monitor when shooting.

### White Balance (Adjusting Hue)

#### Enter $\square$ (auto) mode $\rightarrow$ MENU button $\rightarrow$ White balance $\rightarrow$ M button

The color of light reflected from an object varies with the color of the light source. The human brain is able to adapt to changes in the color of the light source, with the result that white objects appear white whether seen in the shade, direct sunlight, or under incandescent lighting. Digital cameras can mimic this adjustment by processing images according to the color of the light source. This is known as "white balance." For natural colors, select a white balance setting that matches the light source before shooting.

Although **Auto** (the default setting) can be used under most types of lighting, white balance can be adjusted to suit the sky conditions or light source and achieve more natural color tones in the image.

The icon for the current setting is displayed in the monitor when the camera is in shooting mode ( $\square$  8). No icon is displayed when **Auto** is selected.

#### **Using Preset Manual**

Preset manual is used with unusual lighting or to compensate for light sources with a strong color cast when the desired effect has not been achieved with white balance settings like **Auto** and **Incandescent** (for example, to make images shot under a lamp with a red shade look as though they had been shot under white light).

Use the procedure below to measure the white balance value under the lighting used when shooting.


- **1** Prepare a white or gray-colored subject and then place it under the lighting that will be used when shooting.
- 2 Display the shooting menu ( 56), use the multi selector to select **PRE Preset manual** in the **White balance** menu, and then press the Button.
  - The camera zooms in to the position for measuring white balance.

#### Notes About Continuous Shooting

- When Continuous, BSS, or Multi-shot 16 is selected, flash cannot be used. Focus, exposure, and
  white balance are fixed at the values determined with the first image in each series.
- The frame rate with continuous shooting may vary depending upon the current image mode setting, the memory card used, or shooting condition.
- Some settings cannot be used with other functions (🛄 58).

# Notes About Multi-shot 16

Smear ( $\overleftrightarrow$ :3) visible in the monitor when shooting with **Multi-shot 16** enabled is saved with images. Avoiding bright objects such as the sun, reflections of the sun, and electric lights when shooting with **Multi-shot 16** enabled is recommended.

### **ISO Sensitivity**

#### Enter $\square$ (auto) mode $\rightarrow$ MENU button $\rightarrow$ ISO sensitivity $\rightarrow$ M button

When ISO sensitivity is increased, less light is needed when taking pictures.

Higher ISO sensitivity allows darker subjects to be captured. Additionally, even with subjects of similar brightness, pictures can be taken at faster shutter speeds, and blurring caused by camera shake and subject movement can be reduced.

 Although higher ISO sensitivity is effective when shooting darker subjects, shooting without the flash, shooting while using the zoom, etc., images may contain noise.

AUTO Auto (default setting)	Sensitivity is ISO 80 when there is sufficient lighting; the camera compensates by raising sensitivity to a maximum of ISO 1600 when lighting is dim.

The icon for the current setting is displayed in the monitor when the camera is in shooting mode ( $\square$  8).

• When Auto is selected, ISO is not displayed at ISO 80, but is displayed if the ISO sensitivity automatically increases to more than 80.

### Notes About ISO Sensitivity

- Some settings cannot be used with other functions ( $\square$  58).
- When ISO sensitivity is locked, **Motion detection** (🗢 54) does not function.

- Press the multi selector ◀ or ▶ to select images, and then press ▲ or ♥ to set the number of copies for each.



- Note that the Date and Info settings are reset each time the Print order option is displayed.
- The date printed is that saved when the image was captured. Changing the camera's date using **Date and time** or **Time zone** in the **Time zone and date** option in the setup menu after an image has been captured has no effect on the date printed on the image.

When shooting date and time are imprinted on images using the **Print date** option ( $\bigcirc$ 52) in the setup menu, images are saved with shooting date and time imprinted on the image when they are captured. Only the date and time imprinted on images with the print date option will be printed, even if the **Print order** date option is enabled.

You can protect selected images from accidental deletion.

#### If "Memory contains no images." Is Displayed

If a memory card that contains no images is inserted into the camera, **Memory contains no images.** is displayed when the camera is switched to playback mode. # Maximum Movie Recording Time

The following table lists the approximate recording time available when using a 4 GB memory card. Actual recording time and file size may vary depending on subject movement and image composition, even when memory capacity and movie settings remain constant.

\* The maximum size for a single movie is 4 GB, and the maximum recording time for a single movie is 29 minutes, even when there is sufficient free space on the memory card. If the camera becomes hot, movie recording may stop before these limits are reached.

 To confirm the maximum length of a movie that can be recorded in the internal memory (approx. 49 MB), remove the memory card from the camera, and then check the maximum recording time displayed in the monitor when shooting.



# Notes About Print Date

- Imprinted dates form a permanent part of image data and cannot be deleted. The date and time cannot be imprinted on images after they have been captured.
- The date cannot be imprinted in the following situations:
  - When using Panorama assist or Pet portrait (Continuous) in scene mode
  - When recording movies
- Dates imprinted at an Image mode setting (∞24) of III 640×480 may be difficult to read. Select an Image mode setting of I 1600×1200 or larger when using print date.
- The date is saved using the format selected in the setup menu's **Time zone and date** option (🛄 16, 🗢 047).

# Print Date and Print Order

When printing with a DPOF-compatible printer that can print the shooting date and shooting information, you can use the **Print order** option (��34) to print this information in images, even if the **Print date** function was set to **Off** at the time of shooting.

# **Vibration Reduction**

Vibration reduction allows you to reduce the effects of camera shake, which commonly occurs when shooting with zoom applied or when shooting at slow shutter speeds. The effects of camera shake are reduced when recording movies, in addition to when shooting still images.

Set Vibration reduction to Off when shooting using a tripod to stabilize the camera.

# Notes About Vibration Reduction

- After turning on the camera or after switching from playback mode to shooting mode, wait for the shooting mode screen to be displayed completely before taking pictures.
- Due to characteristics of the vibration reduction function, images displayed in the camera's monitor immediately after shooting may be displayed blurry.
- Vibration reduction may be unable to completely eliminate the effects of camera shake in some situations.

# Notes About Motion Detection

- Motion detection may be unable to completely eliminate the effects of subject movement and camera shake in some situations.
- Motion detection may not function if the subject exhibits significant movement or is too dark.
- The images captured using motion detection may be somewhat "grainy" in appearance.

The camera enters sleep mode after 30 seconds when <b>Auto off</b> is set to <b>1 min</b> or less, or after 1 minute when <b>Auto off</b> is set to <b>5 min</b> or more.	

#### When the Monitor Has Turned Off to Save Power

- When the camera is in standby mode, the power-on lamp flashes.
- If no operations are performed for approx. another three minutes, the camera turns off automatically.
- When the power-on lamp is flashing, pressing any of the following buttons turns the monitor back
   on:
  - → Power switch, shutter-release button, 🖸 button, ▶ button, or (MR movie-record) button

# The Auto Off Setting

- The time that passes before the camera enters standby mode is fixed in the following situations:
  - When a menu is displayed: Three minutes
  - During slide show playback: Up to 30 minutes
  - When the AC adapter EH-67 is connected: 30 minutes
- The camera does not enter standby mode while the Eye-Fi card is uploading images.

# Format Memory/Format Card

#### MENU button $\rightarrow$ Y tab $\rightarrow$ Format memory/Format card $\rightarrow$ $\otimes$ button

Use this option to format the internal memory or a memory card.

Formatting the internal memory or memory cards permanently deletes all data. Data that has been deleted cannot be recovered. Be sure to transfer important data to a computer before formatting.

#### Formatting the Internal Memory

To format the internal memory, remove the memory card from the camera. The **Format memory** option is displayed in the setup menu.

#### **Formatting Memory Cards**

When a memory card is inserted in the camera, the **Format card** option is displayed in the setup menu.





#### Notes About Formatting Internal Memory and Memory Cards

- Do not turn the camera off or open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover during formatting.
- The first time you insert a memory card that has been used in another device into this camera, be sure to format it with this camera.



- Files are saved in folders named with a folder number followed by "NIKON" (e.g.
   "100NIKON"). A single folder can hold up to 200 images; if the current folder already
   contains 200 images, a new folder, named by adding one to the current folder name, is
   created the next time an image is captured (e.g. "100NIKON" → "101NIKON"). When the
   number of files within a folder reaches 9999, a new folder is created. File numbers are
   assigned automatically starting with 0001.
- In Panorama assist (202), a folder is created for each shooting session using the following naming convention: "Folder number + P\_XXX" (e.g. "101P\_001"). Images are saved in sequence in file numbers starting with 0001.
- Files copied using Copy > Selected images are copied to the current folder, where they
  are assigned new file numbers in ascending order starting from the largest file number in
  memory. Copy > All images copies all folders from the source medium; file names do not
  change but new folder numbers are assigned in ascending order, starting from the largest
  folder number on the destination medium ( +1).
- If the current folder is numbered 999 and contains 200 images, or an image is numbered 9999, no further images can be captured until the internal memory or memory card is formatted (�•58), or a new memory card is inserted.

# C - Technical Notes and Index

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# The Camera

To ensure safe and continued enjoyment of your Nikon camera, observe the following precautions and the precautions noted in "For Your Safety" ( $\square$  ix-xv) when using or storing your camera.

# Do Not Subject the Product to Strong Shocks

The product may malfunction if dropped or struck. Additionally, do not touch or apply force to the lens.



If water enters the camera, internal components may rust or otherwise become damaged, and repairing the camera may be expensive or even impossible.

# Avoid Sudden Changes in Temperature

Sudden changes in temperature, such as when entering or leaving a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation to form inside the device. To prevent condensation, place the device in a carrying case or a plastic bag before exposing it to sudden changes in temperature.

# Keep away from Strong Magnetic Fields

Do not use or store this device in the vicinity of equipment that generates strong electromagnetic radiation or magnetic fields. Strong static charge or the magnetic fields produced by equipment such as radio transmitters could interfere with the monitor, damage data saved on the memory card, or affect the product's internal circuitry.

# **V** Do Not Point the Lens at Strong Light Sources for Extended Periods

Avoid pointing the lens at the sun or other strong light sources for extended periods when using or storing the camera. Intense light may damage the image sensor or other components, producing a white blur effect in photographs.

## V Turn the Camera off Before Removing the Batteries, AC Adapter, or Memory Card

Removing the batteries, AC adapter, or memory card while the camera is on could damage the camera or memory card. If removed while the camera is saving or deleting data, data may be lost and the camera's memory or the memory card may be damaged.

#### Notes on the Monitor

- Monitors and electronic viewfinders are constructed with extremely high precision; at least 99.99%
  of pixels are effective, with no more than 0.01% being missing or defective. Hence while these
  displays may contain pixels that are always lit (white, red, blue, or green) or always off (black), this is
  not a malfunction and has no effect on images recorded with the device.
- Scraping or pressing on the surface of the monitor may result in damage or malfunction. Should the monitor break, care should be taken to avoid injury caused by broken glass and to prevent the liquid crystal from the display touching the skin or entering the eyes or mouth.
- Images in the monitor may be difficult to see under bright lighting.
- The monitor is lit by an LED backlight. Should the monitor begin to dim or flicker, contact your Nikon-authorized service representative.

### Notes About Smear

White or colored streaks may be visible when bright subjects are framed in the monitor. This phenomenon, known as "smear," occurs when extremely bright light strikes the image sensor; it is characteristic of image sensors and does not indicate a malfunction. Smear may also take the form of partial discoloration in the monitor during shooting. It does not appear in images saved with the camera except in the cases of movies and of images saved with **Multi-shot 16** selected for **Continuous**. When shooting in these modes, we recommend that you avoid bright subjects such as the sun, reflected sunlight, and electric lights.

## Batteries

Be sure to read and follow the warnings noted in "For Your Safety" (🛄 ix-xv) before use.

### Notes About Using Batteries

- Used batteries may overheat. Handle with caution.
- Do not use batteries beyond their recommended expiration date.
- Do not turn the camera on and off repeatedly if discharged batteries are inserted in the camera.

# Spare Batteries

We recommend carrying spare batteries depending on where you are shooting. It may be difficult to purchase batteries in certain areas.

## Charging Batteries

If using optional rechargeable batteries, charge the batteries before taking pictures. Batteries are not charged at the time of purchase.

Be sure to read and follow the warnings noted in the operating instructions included with the battery charger.

#### Charging Rechargeable Batteries

- Do not mix batteries with different amounts of charge remaining, or batteries of a different make or model.
- When using EN-MH2 batteries with the COOLPIX L320, charge four batteries at a time using Battery Charger MH-73. Use only Battery Charger MH-73 to charge EN-MH2 batteries.
- When using Battery Charger MH-73, only charge EN-MH2 batteries.
- EN-MH1 rechargeable Ni-MH batteries cannot be used.

# Notes About Rechargeable Ni-MH Batteries

- If you repeatedly charge rechargeable Ni-MH batteries while they still have some charge
  remaining, the message Battery exhausted. may be displayed prematurely when using the
  batteries. This is due to the "memory effect," in which the amount of charge the batteries can hold
  decreases temporarily. Use the batteries until there is no charge remaining and they will return to
  their normal behavior.
- Rechargeable Ni-MH batteries discharge even when not being used. We recommend charging the batteries just before using them.

### Cold Environment Usage

Battery performance decreases in cold environments. When using the camera in cold environments, try not to let the camera and batteries become too cold. The camera may not function if you use discharged batteries in cold environments. Keep spare batteries warm and alternate between two sets of batteries. Batteries that cannot be used because they have become too cold can often be used again when they have been warmed up.

# Battery Terminals

Dirt on the battery terminals can prevent the camera from functioning. Remove dirt from the terminals using a dry cloth.

#### Remaining Battery Charge

If you insert discharged batteries into the camera, the camera may indicate that the batteries have adequate charge remaining. This is a characteristic of batteries.

## Recycling

Used batteries are a valuable resource. Please recycle used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Cover the battery terminals with plastic tape when recycling.

## **Memory Cards**

- Use only Secure Digital memory cards. Approved memory cards → 🌽 19
- Observe the precautions noted in the documentation included with your memory card.
- Do not affix labels or stickers to the memory card.
- Do not format the memory card using a computer.
- Before using a memory card with this camera, format the card using this camera if the card has been used with another device. Before using a new memory card, we recommend using this camera to format the card.
- Note that formatting a memory card permanently deletes all images and other data on the memory card. If there is data saved on the memory card that you wish to keep, copy that data to a computer before formatting.
- If the message Card is not formatted. Format card? is displayed when you insert a memory card, the memory card must be formatted. If there is data on the memory card that you do not want to delete, select No. Copy that data to a computer before formatting. To format the memory card, select Yes and then press the Ø button.
- Observe the following precautions while formatting the memory card, saving and deleting images, and copying images to a computer, otherwise data or the memory card itself may be damaged.
  - Do not open the battery-chamber/memory card slot cover or remove the memory card or batteries.
  - Do not turn off the camera
  - Do not disconnect the AC adapter

### Cleaning

Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

Lens	When cleaning the lens, avoid touching it directly with your fingers. Remove dust or lint with a blower. To remove fingerprints, oil, or other grime that cannot be removed with a blower, wipe the lens with a soft, dry cloth or an eyeglass cleaning cloth, using a gentle spiral motion that starts in the center and moves toward the edges. Do not wipe forcefully or wipe with a rough cloth, otherwise the camera may be damaged or malfunction. If you still cannot remove the grime, wet a soft cloth with a commercial liquid lens cleaner and gently wipe off the grime.
Monitor	Remove dust or lint with a blower. To remove fingerprints, oil, or other grime, wipe the area with a soft, dry cloth or an eyeglass cleaning cloth. Do not wipe forcefully or wipe with a rough cloth, otherwise the camera may be damaged or malfunction.
Body	<ul> <li>Remove dust or lint with a blower. Wipe with a soft, dry cloth.</li> <li>After using the camera at the beach or other sandy or dusty environment, wipe off any sand, dust, or salt with a dry cloth lightly dampened with fresh water and dry thoroughly.</li> <li>Note that foreign matter inside the camera could cause damage not covered by the warranty.</li> </ul>

## Storage

Remove the batteries if the camera will not be used for an extended period. To prevent mold or malfunction and to ensure long, trouble-free use of the camera, we recommend you insert the batteries and operate the camera approx. once a month. Do not store the camera with naphtha or camphor moth balls, or in any of the following locations:

- Next to equipment that produces strong electromagnetic fields, such as televisions or radios
- Places that are exposed to temperatures below −10 °C (14 °F) or above 50 °C (122 °F)
- Places that are poorly ventilated or subject to humidity of over 60%
